- 5. What sign did God give King Hezekiah concerning his promise that he will recover (v.9)? Do you think this sign was symbolic?
- 6. Read 2 Kings 21:1-15
 - a. What happened in the last 15 years of Hezekiah's life according to v.1?
 - b. List Manasseh's behaviour in v.1-15
 - c. Find as many references to the people of Judah as you can in 21:7-15.
 - d. How do these help explain why Manasseh was able to make such a total reversal of his father's reforms?
- 7. According 2 Kings 20:12-21 (and Isaiah 39), what else happened in the last 15 years of Hezekiah's life? What mistake did Hezekiah make with his visitors from Babylon? How are these events another form of "Manasseh?"
- 8. Look back at Hezekiah's situation in 20:1-11. If Hezekiah could have known the future, including the birth of his son, do you think he would have wanted God to add fifteen years to his life? Why or why not?
